Joyce Plummer: 2020 Molly Osler Volunteer of the Year Award

Each year, Glacier Hills' highest volunteer honor goes to one individual who stands out among all volunteers in years of service as well as depth of involvement. The recipient shines as an example of what it means to serve our community. Molly Osler was our 2019 Volunteer of the Year. An illness abruptly took her from us far too soon. Molly spent every Saturday for eleven years calling Bingo in the Manor Assisted Living. We will always remember Molly because she was so generous not only with her time, but also with her friendship. This year, the Volunteer of the Year Award is renamed in memory of Molly Osler. It is fitting that this is the first time the Volunteer of the Year Award goes to a current resident of Glacier Hills.



Joyce Plummer and her husband Bob moved to Glacier Hills in December of 1996. As soon as they had settled in, Joyce put her library degree to use managing the Glacier Hills library. By early 1997, she was taking books to the Care and Rehab Center once a week to make books accessible to all residents. She also started writing articles for the Glacier Hills newsletter. Joyce has not slowed down since.

Over the years, Joyce volunteered as a Glacier Hills historian, tracking historical information that came into the library. She served on numerous committee assignments including the Foundation Board of Directors, the Dining Committee, and Chair of the Moving Forward Committee. She taught a writing class to residents for a number of years. She is proud of her work with Karl Hauser researching the possibility of opening a Child Development Center here on campus and ultimately proposed the project to the Foundation for funding.

Perhaps Joyce is best known for her role as editor of *Ideas and Images* for the past 20 years. It all started with a few women in the Manor getting together to share short stories and poems. From that small group reading aloud, *Ideas and Images* was born as a few pages stapled together and published twice a year. Today, the publication we know and love is a robust collection of resident essays, poems, short stories, and artwork. It is professionally printed annually for all to enjoy. While she retired as the editor this year, Joyce remains active in the publication of *Ideas & Images* as an advisor and proofreader.

Many Glacier Hills residents know Joyce Plummer as a great neighbor and a good friend. With this award we honor Joyce for her exceptional contributions to our community as a volunteer.

Patty Lynch: The Ruth Monahan Spiritual Service Award By Chaplain Paul Arnold
