It is our pleasure to provide you with this publication journaling our fiscal year 2021 (July 2020 through June 2021). *Making An Impact 2021* is our second offering of this publication, and we are thrilled to be able to share with you some of the stories of how the Glacier Hills Foundation has impacted the lives of those we support: residents, colleagues, the community, and our donors. We hope you will enjoy reviewing the pages that follow.

MISSION AND PURPOSE

The Glacier Hills Foundation was established in 2006 as a 501(c)(3) not-for-profit organization whose primary purpose is to support Glacier Hills, Inc. by serving older adults in an exemplary manner through support alternatives that enrich the whole person. We do this through receiving and administering gifts that fund programs and projects beyond that which operations support.

Our support spans the entire breadth of the continuum, including independent living, assistant living, memory care, rehabilitation, and skilled nursing. Colleagues of Glacier Hills also receive a significant amount of support through scholarships, emergency hardship, child development center scholarships, and other training and education.

The Foundation manages many different funds that include endowments, quasi-endowments, and expendable funds meant to be used immediately. Foundation current assets are approximately \$12,160,000.

A separate Board of Directors oversees the Foundation. The board comprises residents and members of the community-at-large, and members of the Glacier Hills, Inc. corporate board serve in ex-officio capacity.


GLACIER HILLS, INC. LEADERSHIP


SISTER SUPPORT


